With vaccines available for ages 5 and up and the pandemic restrictions have eased, masks are optional, the plan is to proceed with the 2023 Youth Education Public Speaking Competitions (YE PS) at all levels. I have reserved the Kanata Legion, Branch #638 (as usual) to host the Zone G6 Youth Education Public Speaking Competition scheduled on Saturday, March 4, 2023 I am <u>assuming</u> as it was last year during these uncertain times, if the 2023 YE PS competitions must be cancelled a directive from the Provincial Youth Education Committee will be sent to all District YE PS Chairs and Zones and Branches will subsequently be notified at the latest in December. Of course, each Branch will determine if they proceed with their Youth Education Public Speaking competition pending the pandemic status.

I ask each Branch to confirm with me their Youth Education Public Speaking Chair for 2022-2023 from the list below at the September 18, 2022, Zone G6 Council meeting, please.

All Branches and Zones should have received from Ontario Command a Youth Education Package dated July 11, 2022, which includes the current Public Speaking Rules and Regulations and the current forms to be used. Should I receive French Youth Education Public Speaking correspondence, I will advise the Youth Education Public Speaking Chairs of its availability.

Aida Kostuck, Secretary, Provincial Youth Education Committee has requested Branches provide YE PS competitions dates, times, Branch and location as soon as the competition is scheduled in the event a youth is asking for where the nearest PS competition is she will have a Branch YE PS competition list to refer to. Therefore, I ask each Zone G6 Branch to forward to me their Branch YE PS Competition date, registration times, location and phone number as soon after it is scheduled as possible, please.

In the event the 2023 Public Speaking competitions will proceed, I ask each Branch to pass on the following information to their YE-PS Chair, please:

- The Public Speaking Contest Statistics form and the Public Speaking Contest Forwarding Form are dated 2023. All other forms need to be dated 2023.
- A reminder to only use forms and regulations from the package issued the summer of 2022.

In addition to the forms and regulations, the Branch Public Speaking Chair will need to know:

- The <u>absolute deadline</u> to submit your Branch winners for Zone G6 YE PS competition is <u>Tuesday</u>, February 28, 2023
- Zone G6 YE PS competition location: Branch #638-Kanata, 70 Hines Rd., Kanata, Ontario Phone: 613-591-5570
- Dates and locations of the 2023 <u>District</u> and <u>Area</u> level competitions to be announced as soon as is possible/7

- <u>Zone G6</u> Youth Education Public Speaking prize amounts for each of the four categories are:
 - 1st place \$40.00 / 2nd place \$30.00 / 3rd place \$20.00
- Branch prize amounts should not exceed Zone prize amounts. It was agreed among the branches that only if a Branch is in a position/has the resources to increase the prize amounts for public speaking to the suggested amounts below that they do so. Something a Branch may wish to consider before making a prize amount decision is whether they wish to have the same prize amounts for the posters, poems and essays competition.

- 1st place \$30.00 / 2nd place \$20.00 / 3rd place \$10.00

The provision of a public speaking competition for youth is not only one of the best ways we can showcase the Legion in our local communities it is also an opportunity for youth to gain experience, self-confidence and skills!

Suggested ways and means of how best to increase participation if COVID19 protocols and safety measures permit are to:

- consider forming a Youth Education Committee to support the YE-PS Chair
- establish a contact at each school
- create a public speaking competition poster notice and post in schools, libraries, etc.
- when promoting the posters, poems and essays competition highlight public speaking to allow more time for schools to consider, if possible, to incorporate into the school curriculum
- suggest public speaking as an extracurricular activity in the schools
- approach youth organizations where public speaking may be a badge/award to achieve
- to increase the reach, particularly home school students it is important to promote in social media in the community via local papers, church bulletins, community centres, stores
- promote at your legion with posters, newsletters, email, website, social media

Youth Education Public Speaking highlights from the June 24, 2017 minutes of the Provincial Youth Education Committee are:

- It was moved and seconded that a projector is not allowed at a public speaking competition
- It was moved and seconded that home-schooled students are allowed to enter the public speaking competition
- Where to send students: The normal procedure is that students compete at the branches closest to their schools. If a branch is not participating, then students are referred to another branch, under the same zone. If a school is not doing public speaking, then students are referred to the branch closest to their homes. Home schooled students are referred to the branch closest to their homes.
- The legion should encourage all students to participate in the public speaking program. There is no agreement as per the number of students that the school can send but schools with this query are to be referred to the branch and it is up to the branch to advise the schools on how many students they can accommodate at the competition

This ends my report and I move its' adoption.

Membership

Branch # 192 membership renewals for this past year are at approximately 98%. Previous year we had 382 members in good standing compared to 374 currently at this time. We have also had quite a few online enrolments; however, we have had a lot of people say that they are having trouble trying to renew their memberships online. Our Membership Chairman has been in touch with Command to coordinate.

Poppy

Our 2022 Poppy Campaign is in the planning stage; however, we are looking forward to running a very successful Poppy Season with volunteers being able to stand at different venues. Hopefully everything goes well and we go back to having a full Remembrance Day service.

Veterans Service

Our Veterans Service officer has seen an average of 2 Veterans per month to help and assist with VAC services since the last report.

Finance

The Branch finances are doing very well. We just paid down \$28,000.00 on our loan as we had to renew our rate and the increase was almost double! We now only owe approximately \$10,850.00 out of \$70,000.00 that was taken out. This will be paid off next year with the help of our LA. Our Catch the Ace online lottery partnered with the Carleton Place and District Memorial Hospital Foundation is doing extremely well. We are starting Catch the Ace 3.0 and our ticket sales go online on 22 September with the first draw being on the 29th September. We are again seeding the Jackpot with a prize of \$10,000.00! As you know, on 20th December 2021 our Branch had a major flood in the basement. We have been dealing with insurance and all is going well as can be. The problem found was the main sewer pipe that connects to the Town has rotted out. We have now fixed the problem and have been going forward with our renovations. The reason for this taking so long has been due to supply and demand.

Ways and Means

We had our Annual Corn Roast at the end of August which was a very successful event. We worked together with our LA and it had a great impact. We had approximately 200 people in attendance throughout the day with vendors, DJ / Karoake, BBQ and Free Corn. As well, our rental hall bookings continue to be successful all through the Summer and into the Fall. This definitely brings in some good income. Lastly, we have started a "special drink happy hour" on Friday afternoons that has created quite the momentum. We used to only sell approximately \$50-75.00 from the bar in the afternoon and that has now gone up to \$400-750.00 for the same time period. Sometimes you just have to try something new!

Ladies Auxiliary

The Ladies Auxiliary have been pretty busy last few months. They have been getting catering functions and a lot of Celebrations of Life as families are getting caught up since reopening. We also had representation sent to the Ladies Auxiliary Convention in Kingston.

Constitution and Bylaws

Sports

Our Dart Leagues have just started up after the Labour Day weekend. A Drop-In Dart League has started up on Monday nights and continues to do very well with attendance. We have also restarted our Ladies Auxiliary Dart League and Men's drop-in Darts on Tuesdays, a Branch Singles Dart League on Wednesdays and the Branch Mixed Dart League on Thursdays, and all are extremely happy to be getting back into it. This definitely helps with our Bar sales and overall income for the Branch.

Overall

We have been pretty busy dealing with problems and repairs for our building that is over 55 years old since the last report period. We are starting to be quite busy at our Branch being open to the public; however, the basement remains closed and will be for the near futue. We are thankful to still be able to use the upstairs main hall and lounge. We keep monitoring our finances on a weekly basis. We are very flexible to adjust to the current situation as it changes.
